LONGTIME RESIDENT, BUSINESSMAN BILL POSTMA CELEBRATES 90TH BIRTHDAY

When Bill Postma opened Postma's Furniture on Pioneer Blvd. 53 years ago, he was a strapping man of 37 years old. Now turning 90, he's still very active, both physically and mentally.

"I've been very healthy throughout all my life, up until May of this year when I suffered a stroke," said Postma. Rest assured, he has recovered very well and can be seen walking up and down Pioneer Blvd. saying "Hi" to his neighbors.

"When I opened up Postma's Furniture in 1962," said Postma, "there were more cows than people. What drew us was the Dutch community at the time, as I am Dutch myself."

"I enjoy all the Indian businesses, and they are some of

the friendliest people I know," said Postma. "The neighbors have changed over time, and they're still changing, but it's still a friendly town. There are Cambodians, Indians, and, of course, Portuguese and the Dutch. That's why I like Artesia."

Prior to opening Postma's Furniture, Mr. Postma served in the United States Air Corp (Army) toward the end of World War II, taught 7th grade at Bellflower Christian Schools for three years, and worked for

Koopman's Furniture in Bellflower before opening Postma's.

"Ninety years old," reflected Mr. Postma, "it sounds old. But I do pretty much everything I did before, just a little slower."

Team Artesia volunteers assist Artesia resident with tree removal

Timber! Thanks to Team Artesia Volunteer Corps, one resident had a very large, dead tree removed from her yard.

"I'd very much like to thank Team Artesia for their help. That tree was dead, and was in danger of falling," said property owner Adelaide Vasquez.

Vasquez, a senior citizen, was unable to hire a professional tree trimmer. So she contacted the City of Artesia, who asked if Team Artesia would be able help. They were.

Team Artesia quickly determined that the fifty-foot tall tree was in danger of falling onto Vasquez' house or into a neighboring property.

New Life Community Church sponsored a professional arborist to cut down the tree. Team Artesia cleared the cut wood from the property afterward. Republic Services donated the disposal bin.

Civic organizations like the Freemasons; local churches like New Life Community Church; and individual volunteers like Artesian Rene Trevino; all of whom participated in this particular project, come together under the Team Artesia umbrella to provide help and solve problems, and in so doing, create a stronger, better community.

Are you looking to be an involved resident? Do you want to give back to your community? Do you have skills that you think would be an asset to your neighbors?

Team Artesia Volunteer Corps invites you to be part of a great public service team, help people, make new friends, and make a difference in your community.

Team Artesia tasks are wide-ranging and many – from helping an elderly neighbor with a challenging project (see tree removal article on facing page), to helping at community events like the International Street Fair & Diversity Festival, the Just Dump It community cleanup event, and the Public Safety Expo & Youth Safety Day.

Team Artesia even has its own event – the Go Green Expo – where passionate volunteers host an event designed to give residents and businesses information and incentives to be more sustainable, conserve water, recycle, and be mindful of the environment.

Team Artesia also partners with local agencies. This past September, as part of the Red Cross campaign to reduce home fire deaths by 25 percent, Team Artesia and the Red Cross teamed up to install 173 new smoke alarms in North Artesia.

On January 26, Team Artesia will be partnering with the Los Angeles County Homeless Services Authority to conduct an annual homeless count. Team Artesia needs volunteers to help with the count during the late evening and early morning hours. While there are not a lot of homeless individuals living in Artesia, this is a worthwhile effort because the results of this count give the county as a

whole valuable insight into the size and distribution of its homeless population, which then informs the development of strategies to reduce homelessness.

Joining Team Artesia is simple and, of course, free; just contact the City at 562-860-6262. Meetings are held at City Hall on the first Wednesday of the month at 3 pm. If you can't make the meetings – that's okay, because Team Artesia keeps everyone in the loop through emails and phone calls. Team Artesia opens up the doors of opportunity to all its members for all of its projects, so join us and discover how gratifying participation can be.

Waste hauler CR&R, Inc. begins services

Residents and businesses began receiving waste hauling services from the City's new contractor on November 9, 2015.

CR&R, Inc. provides waste hauling services to customers in many Southern California cities, including Artesia's neighbors in the cities of Norwalk and Bellflower. Artesia's City Council unanimously approved the new waste hauling franchise agreement with CR&R, Inc. on July 20, 2015.

FEATURES AND BENEFITS OF THE NEW CONTRACT

The new agreement puts the City on the cutting edge for franchise agreements. It provides for numerous community benefits:

- Contract holds rates down to current levels for a minimum of two more years and caps future rate increase requests
- Collection programs provide for solid waste, recyclables, green waste, and organic waste
- Free cart walk-out service for persons with disabilities
- Bulky item services include four free pick-ups per year
- Free holiday tree collection
- Free residential sharps collection (provides for the safe disposal of needles for residents managing health issues such as diabetes)
- Free electronic waste collection
- Free scout and push-out services if the bins are less than 50 feet away from the truck
- The hauler is responsible for cleaning out bin enclosures
- Commercial customers are allowed to use either bins or carts, depending on their size constraints
- Hauler required to provide numerous services to the City, including but not limited to:
 - Free bins for the collection of illegally dumped materials
 - Free collection services at City-sponsored events
 - Free City-wide clean-up events
 - Free trash removal at City events
 - Free porta-potties at City events
 - Free collection of solid waste from City facilities
 - Free document shredding
- Contract provides a system to implement any new collection programs that may become mandated
- Contract provides multiple safeguards and protections for the City and its residents

ONE OF THE BEST FEATURES OF THE NEW AGREEMENT is that the contract holds trash collection rates down to current levels for a minimum of two more years, and it also caps future rates. The previous contract had no caps on rate increases whatsoever. This new provision in the contract provides Artesia's residents with an important protection.

WHY DO WE NEED A NEW CONTRACT?

In response to a national crisis in landfill capacity, and broad acceptance of the strategy known as reduce, reuse, recycle – environmentally sound land filling and transformation as the desired approach to solid waste management, California passed Assembly Bill 939 in 1989. This legislation mandated an integrated framework for program implementation, solid waste planning, and solid waste facility and landfill compliance.

Since then, California cities have had to respond effectively to increasingly rigorous solid waste management strategies, diversions goals, and regulatory requirements.

The program complexities, with which the City of Artesia must comply, have increased exponentially in the last twenty-five years. Reflecting the realities of this complex service delivery environment is the fact that the new contract with CR&R for solid waste management is 103 pages long. It replaces a seven-page contract.

WHY NOW?

The City of Artesia's previous trash hauling franchise agreement expired on November 8, 2015. In anticipation, the City Council spent a year considering its options for addressing this deadline and ultimately adopted a new and much-improved franchise agreement after two properly-noticed special meetings held on July 1 and July 20, 2015.

Public Safety Expo and Youth Safety Day

Artesia's Public Safety Expo and Youth Safety Day is just around the corner. Get an up-close look at search and rescue trucks, SWAT vehicles, helicopters and other tools used by the personnel of the LA County Sheriff's and Fire departments.

Exciting public safety demonstrations will include K-9 officers, a bomb disposal robot, putting out fires, and the Jaws of Life, which uses hydraulic power to pry open metal so that firefighters can get into a vehicle and safely remove passengers who may be trapped inside or too injured to escape. The Expo will also have exhibits from many different organizations, like the Red Cross.

Youth Safety Day will feature thrilling freestyle BMX bike demonstrations by Team Soil meant to illustrate the importance of wearing safety gear.

Youth are eligible to enter a raffle to win bicycles, safety gear, and other awesome prizes by completing a bicycle safety course, visiting educational displays, watching demonstrations, and receiving a stamp in their Safety Passport at each stop along the way.

In conjunction with World Spay Day, LA County Animal Control is hosting a pet adoption event and a low-cost pet vaccination clinic.

Residents learn about sustainability at Artesia's Go Green Expo

About 400 people visited the Go Green Expo at Artesia Park on October 24, to learn about different ways to save or make money by conserving electricity and water, recycling, driving electric vehicles, or taking advantage of rebates and discounts through utility companies.

Youth participated in an Eco-Art contest with prizes awarded in four categories: the People's Choice Award, and judges scoring the elementary, middle, and high school entries. The People's Choice Award went to Ananya Ramachandran, first place in the elementary school contest was awarded to Adithya Anand, first place in the middle school contest was awarded to Emily Baas, and first place in the high school contest was awarded to Kyla Crisilogo. Winners won a \$100 scholarship from Team Artesia Volunteer Corp.

The event was hosted by the City of Artesia and Team Artesia Volunteer Corps, and featured vehicle displays (electric, hydrogen fuel cell, natural gas, and hybrid), booths, an Eco-Art contest, food, and raffles. CR&R, the City's new waste hauler, supplied all the prizes for the event.

International STREET FAIR & Diversity Festival

Attendance estimates approached 40,000 over the entire 11 am to 11 pm Diversity Festival. Organizers calculate attendance at almost double last year's estimate.

Exciting urban design supports a high-quality pedestrian and transit experience

Artesians are buzzing about the progress being made on Pioneer Boulevard between 183rd and 188th streets, which is currently undergoing its much-anticipated transformation. The purpose of these improvements is to heighten people's sense of safety and comfort, and maintain their interest, when visiting the City's downtown. Creating an environment that supports these three critical urban design objectives will encourage more frequent and longer visits by shoppers and diners, which will increase the amount of economic activity in the downtown shopping district. More jobs and more local tax dollars increase the economic health of the entire community, including the overall standard of living of the residents.

WHAT IS BEING DONE TO PIONEER BOULEVARD?

For many years, the City has been gradually moving southward on Pioneer Boulevard with a multi-year capital improvement program. The street segments that were originally addressed by this multi-year capital improvement program are:

North of the 91 Freeway to Artesia Blvd.

This project was COMPLETED.

Artesia Blvd to 183rd Street

This project was COMPLETED.

183rd Street to 188th Street

This project is currently UNDERWAY.

The project that is currently underway runs from 183rd Street to 188th Street. It is very ambitious because it contains an extensive set of amenities. Because of its complexity, it is being undertaken in 3 phases.

Phase 1 improvements include wide, pedestrian-friendly sidewalks, extensive streetscaping, and single traffic lanes. These improvements will enhance the pedestrian experience, make it possible for restaurants along the boulevard to offer more outdoor dining, and reduce traffic speeds so that vehicle occupants will be traveling slowly enough to



see store fronts and appreciate retail merchandising along the boulevard.

Phase 2 will bring beautification features to the boulevard which have been designed to encourage shoppers to linger: street furniture, bike racks, pedestrian-oriented decorative lighting and signage, trees to provide a pleasant shade canopy, landscaping planters, and more.

Phase 3 will add a large pedestrian promenade to the center of the boulevard where lively events and engagement can occur. This phase contemplates water features such as a splash pad and fountains, a plaza, and even a small performance venue, along with more street furniture, decorative lighting, additional trees, and landscaping.

WHAT IS THE GOAL FOR THIS PROJECT?

The goal is to increase economic activity in the City's main commercial corridor by driving more foot traffic. This is being done by enhancing the shopping and dining experience for patrons of Pioneer Boulevard businesses through good urban planning and modernization of the street features.

This final leg of the Pioneer Boulevard improvement program contains the most amenities. It is expected to contribute the most to the community's vision for the public

infrastructure needed to support the goal of achieving a complementary mix of commercial retail, office and residential use, which will expand economic vibrancy and livability in the City's core commercial area.

All of the improvements have been designed to create a sense of place at a human scale, and to provide enclosure, transparency, linkages, and visual coherence to the boulevard. These qualities are necessary if this public space is going to meet the human needs for ease of use, a sense of safety, a level of interest, and a sense of comfort. These are hallmarks of high-quality destination shopping and dining venues.

The improvements have been conceived and designed expressly to increase foot traffic in the international downtown shopping district.

WHAT IS THE BENEFIT OF DOING THIS?

These public improvements are being undertaken to encourage and support the private development of a complementary mix of commercial retail, office, and residential uses. The creation of this mix is a proven strategy that has been implemented in many other communities to increase economic activity and livability in core commercial areas.

Income: Improving the economic activity in an area results in more jobs, better paying jobs, and a better standard of living for individuals accessing the economic engine in this way.

Growth in Capital: Improving the economic activity in an area also results in more productive use of the property in that area. When the productivity of an asset is maximized, it is frequently referred to as having achieved its *highest and best use*. Using property for its highest and best use results in better and stronger property values, and helps to insulate property values from external economic pressures. For individuals accessing the economic engine in this way, a better standard of living will also be the long term result.

This economic robustness and resiliency in both active and passive income and wealth building strategies ultimately translates into a better quality of life for Artesians, because more jobs and more local tax dollars increase the overall wealth of the entire community, including the overall standard of living of the people in the community.

Traffic detours are anticipated during construction; please seek alternate routes or allow extra travel time when driving through the construction zone.

New Dial-A-Ride services announced

Artesia's City Council has approved an agreement for innovative new transportation services beginning January 1. Fiesta Taxi will provide individual cars to transport Artesia residents 60+ or disabled to and from their destinations. Individual car service will shorten the ride times and pick-up windows for passengers.



The Parks & Recreation Department will register existing customers with Artesia Dial-A-Ride by Fiesta Taxi; there is no need to re-register for the program. Staff will be contacting existing customers to distribute new swipe card IDs, which will need to be presented to Fiesta Taxi drivers when using the service. Staff is available to help customers with this transition.

New customers may register for Dial-A-Ride Services at the Artesia Park Office. Please call 562-860-3361 to make a registration appointment.

The telephone number for customers wishing to make

appointments for rides after January 1 is **562-865-6266**.

Parks & Recreation Manager Melissa Burke is enthusiastic about the new program, "The individual Dial-A-Ride car services provided by Fiesta Taxi will save close to \$40,000 annually. This is a more efficient service being offered at a lower cost. The savings are being reprogrammed into expanding Metro's fixed-route bus services to a larger portion of Artesia. Those services are available to the general public. We're always striving for these types of opportunities because it ultimately results in community-wide quality-of-life improvements."




